FINAL EXERCISES END SCHOOL FOR THIRTY-EIGHT GRADS

Manning High Auditorium was the scene this week of two impressive ceremonies which marked the close of public school activities for thirty eight members of the Senior graduating class. Baccalaureate exercises were held Sunday evening and Commencement last night, with a capacity crowd witnessing both events.

John L. Horsley, Simpson College instructor and widely known speaker gave the address at the Baccalaureate services and in doing so gave the members of the senior class an inspiration which should aid them in their endeavors toward a successful career. He told them to select a goal and then to work towards that end with every available talent and every means in command. He cited instances when individuals with wealth, position, education and the possibilities for the greatest opportunity, had turned all this aside to go into the field where ignorance, filth and poverty existed merely because they felt their great talents would do the most good there and they could fulfill their greatest satisfaction in life, that of helping others find the light, cast a life of ease and position aside to do it.

The speaker stated that the future of the world in business, politics, religion, etc., depended upon the new generation and upon the ability of those who now step out into the world. He told them to equip themselves to the best of their ability, find their particular goal and launch every effort toward the attainment of that end.

Dr. Herbert John Burgstahler, President of Cornell College gave the principal address at Commencement. In well chosen words, this speaker of note brought out the picture of the future for the graduates and the part they have to play in the world of tomorrow, in the field of endeavor whatever it may be, and the possibilities, the pitfalls and the hardships they will encounter and which they must overcome to find life in its fullest measure. Events on the Commencement program other than mentioned here previously was the announcement of the honor roll, the ten highest ranking students in the Senior Class, based on their scholastic record for the four years of high school. Superintendent Amos C. Lee made the announcement in the order of standing which was as follows: Neva Dietz, Jeanne Boss, Virginia Thompson, Gene Claussen, Wesley Lage, Helen Kuhn, Robert Hoffmann, Billy Hunter, Merlin Asmus and Merle Curtis.

At the same time Superintendent Lee made the special awards, the three awards for the most outstanding students in the several fields of high school activity based on the four year records. Miss Neva Dietz, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Dietz, was given the scholastic medal, having the highest average of the class for her four years of high school.

Miss Jeanne Boss, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Boss, was presented the Activities award. Miss Boss has been outstanding in music, dramatics, commercial activities as well as having a high scholastic standing.

Amos Misselhorn, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Misselhorn, was given the athletic award. He has been outstanding in all fields of sport during his high school career and is one of the best all-around athletes to graduate from Manning High in recent years.

Entering the ministry, he served successfully the Central Congregational Church of Saint Paul, Greenwood Union Church, Greenwood, Massachusetts, then the second largest union church in the nation, Lake Harriet Church, Minneapolis.

He assumed the presidency of Cornell in 1927, and the ten years of his administration have been marked by a physical expansion of the college, an enlargement of its financial resources, and the inauguration of progressive educational policies.

An educational leader, Dr. Burgstahler has maintained high scholastic standards and has encouraged curriculum revision.
