The score as the fourth quarter opened was 16 to 9 in favor of the Bulldogs. However, Coon Rapids, lead by the flashy Johnson, made three baskets in short order as the quarter opened and from then on it was a dog fight with Manning holding a one point lead. With a minute and a half to go, Harold Hoffmann tipped in a basket to put the Bulldogs ahead 20 to 17. Coon came back to score two baskets in the remaining play. As the game ended, Kenneth Esser, Lyle Arp and Harold Hoffmann were trying vainly for a goal under the Bulldog hoop but the gun ended the game without further scoring. Manning was ahead at the half 9 to 8. The Bulldogs defeated Coon Rapids 24 to 19 here several weeks ago.
