Basketball squad holds strenuous practice drills

After the last bell rings, members of the basketball squad hurry to the cage and get dressed quickly. After they are dressed, there is a mad scramble for the new basketballs. A player isn't supposed to get a ball until he is dressed for practice, but some usually manages to hide a good ball before he gets dressed, thus he doesn't have to dress so fast and is assured of a good ball unless someone finds it.

As soon as they reach the floor they practice shooting until 4:15. During this time some of the boys play 21, sometimes two boys work together to practice driving and defense and other boys just shoot around.

During the next stage of practice three teams run the fast break drill. In this drill, Coach Ray Standerwick shoots and one of the teams rebounds and sets up a fast break, trying to score against a defense. After that Coach Standerwick works with first team half court on offense and defense, while Coach John Beach does the same with the second team at the other end of the floor.

Next on the practice schedule is usually a full court scrimmage. On a night before a game each team usually scrimmages one quarter and on other nights they usually scrimmage two or more quarters. By this time the players are usually worn out and ready to shower, but wait, there is still something else: wind sprints, either five or 10, the length of the floor, and then the showers.

Between the different parts of practice everyone has to shoot a free throw, if he makes it he gets another shot, then it's the next person's turn. Practice is usually over about 5:30 on nights before a game and around 6:00 on other nights. By Eugene Haberl

Now that the regular basketball season has ended and tournaments are coming up, it is a good time to look back over a very successful season.

Our record which shows 18 wins against one loss is one of the better records in the state. Our only loss came at the hands of Carroll in an overtime defeat early in the season, but we avenged that loss by defeating the Tigers in the return game. We now have a 15-game winning streak going which includes wins over Carroll and Harlan, the first and second place teams in the Midwest conference, Mapleton, the winners of their conference, and Moorhead, one of the top contenders for the class "B" state championship from the area.

We won the Coon Valley conference championship this year by defeating every team in the conference by a sizeable margin. The team is currently leader in both the Omaha World-Herald poll and the Associated Press poll among basketball teams in southwest Iowa.

The offensive average and defensive average that the team compiled is an indication of its ability. While we scored an average of 65 points a game we held our opponents to an average of 41.1 points per game. Jon Groteluschen is our leading scorer for the season with 350 points, Larry Nielsen is next with 238 points and Bob Laverty is third with 235 points. by Eugene Haberl
